Area 31 Career Day

I hope everyone has had a great summer.

The work outlook in the Indianapolis Chapter continues to be fantastic. All contractors continue to be extremely busy and will remain so for the foreseeable future for all branches of the trade.

The larger projects in the area are still the IU Health Hospital project, Eli Lilly Lebanon, and the Signia hotel in downtown Indianapolis. Lebanon has also broken ground on the LEAP District, a 1,500-acre campus on SR 32 west of I-65. We currently have four planned data centers in the Indianapolis Chapter in Monrovia, Pittsboro, Greenfield, and Lebanon.

The abundance of work is a fantastic opportunity for us, but it does come with challenges, primarily worker shortages. We are making every effort to organize and grow our membership.

The Masonry Capstone at Cascade High School is beginning their second year and it is now a full-time program. Walker Career Center at Warren Central High School began with Jarnell Conrad as the instructor. Ali Garnett, Apprenticeship Marketing Director, continues to seek opportunities to introduce the Capstone program to more schools.

We continue to attend more High School Career Days/Job Fairs. Ali Garnett has done a fantastic job in opening more opportunities for us. We have seen our apprenticeship applications increase in the last two years and they keep getting better.

I am excited to announce that CJ Thrasher has been hired as the permanent PCC Instructor starting this fall. CJ brings a wealth of experience and knowledge and is very eager to teach our PCC apprentices. I want to thank Roger Jones for all his efforts with this. It has been a long-time goal with a lot of obstacles, but this is huge for all of Local 4.

I keep saying this, but I would like to thank our Central Indiana Organizer, Carlos Alvarez, for all his efforts. He has been a game changer in our organizing efforts and continues to be a great asset to Local 4, especially in the Central Indiana area.

I would encourage everyone to remember that we collaborated hard with our contractors to agree on "break" language in our contract. Please do not abuse this. It is a ten-minute break: at or near your workstation." If it is abused or taken for granted, it can be taken away. We are also having an abundance of absenteeism. We all have personal lives and legitimate reasons to miss work, but I constantly get calls from contractors about our members missing work

Our current contract expires May 31, 2026, and negotiations will be here before we know it. Please bring any thoughts and ideas to your chapter meeting or contact your Field Rep.

**Dekalb Athletics** 

The US construction market is expected to grow at a CAGR of 4.4% between 2025 and 2034, reaching \$2.92 trillion by 2034. BAC Local 4 IN/KY staff track all projects as they are listed in the Construct Connect Database. Letters are sent to owners, developers, and construction managers to inform them about Local 4 IN/KY and provide a list of signatory contractors. Follow-up phone calls are made to identify potential subcontractors. Local 4 is fully committed to increasing its market share within the masonry industry.

A recent blitz in the Fort Wayne Chapter counties showed that Schmucker Masonry is working on projects including car washes, banks, hotels, apartments, and water treatment plants. Carrington continues to work with a small number of former members on gas stations, dealerships, strip malls, and libraries. Some nonunion teams from Illinois and Michigan are completing stick-on stone and brick work, reflecting the ongoing growth in Fort Wayne.

FM Tile was recently granted Market Recovery Funds for the Leo HS terrazzo portion. Those funds will keep nonunion contractor, Dancer Concrete Design, off the terrazzo project and will put our members to work. Also, FCI Construction recently finished up one of the Bippus State Bank that had Market Recovery dollars awarded. President Steve Knowles and his Management Team understands that it is beneficial for several reasons to grant MR funds on certain projects. It keeps the nonunion out and creates manhours for our members. We negotiated our Tile / Terrazzo contract this year with members Brandon Lemberg and Alberto Gonzalez doing a great job negotiating a 4 ¾ increase each year on a 3-vr contract.

The future appears even brighter with Nippon's acquisition of US Steel and their commitment to invest billions into Gary Works, with their first announced project being the complete reline of #14 blast furnace scheduled for the second quarter of 2026.

There are several outages scheduled for October, including a stove reline at US Steel and a Fluid Catalytic Cracking Unit turnaround at BP. With the current worker shortages, please check in if you're available for work.

Our annual retiree picnic was a success. It's always great to see our brothers and sisters come together, sharing memories and stories from their years in the trade. The Labor Day parade was another success, and I would like to thank everyone who helped build the float, participated in the parade, and the contractors whose donations made this year the best yet.

This year's golf outing saw an increase in participation with 108 golfers. We encourage everyone to continue to show support for this event to ensure its continuation for years to come.

Members rarely reach the historic milestone of 75 years, but what makes Fred Colvin receiving his 75-year plaque special is that he is the founder of Colvin Masonry, which is now a third-generation contractor being run by his son Jeff and grandsons Chad, Eric, and Shane, all of whom carry a union card. Our contract ends June 1, 2026. Members should attend meetings and share their input for next year's contract negotiations to ensure their voices are heard during negotiations.

With over 50 apprentices in the field and many bricklayers nearing retirement, it is crucial to mentor these apprentices who are the future of this Union.

I'd also like to welcome Jose Ramirez to the Local 4 IN/KY team. He has proven to be a guick learner and a valuable asset to our union.


